## Study Guide Questions—Tip Lewis and His Lamp Chapters 7 & 8

1. Tip Lewis comes up the hill with a resolute, firm step. He is determined to attend school steadily and promptly from now on! Yet before he even steps into the school room, his mischievous old playfellow, Bob Turner, meets him. Tip's heart sinks as he sees his friend, for he suddenly realizes the temptations that lie before him. Bob would surely expect Tip to join in all his rambunctious, foolish ways. Such a "friend" as Bob can be a trial indeed for the growing Christian! The Bible talks a lot about what kind of friends we should have. Some friends build us up and encourage us while others bring us down or lead us into temptation. Proverbs 1:10-19 teaches about the kind of friends we are to avoid. Consider how Tip lived this verse out and how it opened up a door to bring his own little sister to church and give her the gospel. What changes have others seen in you that demonstrate your relationship with Jesus?
- 5. On pages 65-66, Tip is about to read from his Bible for the first time. However, in order to do so he must overcome his feelings of shame and muster all the resolve he has in order to read the Scriptures. However, he is rudely taunted and shamed by his friend Bob. To make things worse, Bob pulls Tip's hair, tickles his foot, and steps on his toes! The story reads that, "Tip never forgot the trials of that day, nor the hard work which he had to endure them."
